## Is Seeking Applicants for a 75% Temporary Assistant Professor Position Beginning Fall, 2009

The University of Georgia, School of Social Work (SSW) is seeking to hire a 75% 12-month Temporary Assistant Professor Position in the Child Welfare Title IV-E Education Program. Duties will include the following: half of the position's effort are for the evaluation of the 2008/2009 and 2009/2010 IV-E program and the pilot Child Welfare Professional Leader Program, and the other half assisting with DFCS practicum placements, providing MSW concentration practicum field liaison services to stipend students in their DFCS concentration internships, working with county Division of Family and Children Services (DFCS) administrators to select future leaders to participate in the IV-E MSW program, assisting in the recruitment and selection of IV-E child welfare stipend students and with the administration of this program. Attending monthly faculty meetings and monthly DFCS/University consortium meetings in Macon are also job expectations.

**Requirements for the position** include a doctorate in Social Work, 10 years post MSW child welfare experience in GA DFCS, and MSW concentration practicum field liaison service. Previous work in IV-E Child Welfare Educational Programs, as well as child welfare research and evaluation experience is also desired.
